
Writing new urban histories

Split into three volumes chronologically, The Cambridge Urban History of Europe comprehensively and methodically examines Europe's long urban history from its pre-historic roots through to today. Featuring over a hundred essays from experts across various disciplines and countries, the volumes provide an up-todate analysis of current issues and major themes in urban studies, and shed new light on regions that are often ignored or receive marginal treatment.
